Our services have reached into thousands of homes from Virginia and Pennsylvania to New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts. Many hundreds of views have been recorded over the last week.

We did not plan to have an online ministry. We started hoping to stay connected to you here on Cape Cod. But now that this ministry has expanded we are grateful and humbled by it. This week after reading my report, (see page 3), the Church Council voted unanimously to support this new Online Ministry wholeheartedly. While we don't know exactly where God is leading us we are pleased to tell you we are now receiving letters from people who are watching weekly. I am very grateful to our camera crew - Matt Scinto, Ann Tucker, Becky Sullivan and Al Eaton. Our music tech for every service has been Peggy O'Connor.

Here, on page 3, is the story of how this new ministry evolved. Where it goes, only God knows. We will keep you posted.



Online Worship Report

When we stopped having in-person worship in March our last public service in the sanctuary was held on March 8, 2020. It happened to be a concert with a local folk singer. Then, on March 15 we announced at the end of the week that the coronavirus COVID 19 had become a public health concern and possibly a crisis in Boston and New York. Our denomination and state government was urging churches not to hold worship services in person. With advice from Deacons we decided to suspend public worship.

Building on the strength of a 3-year habit of televising our worship services on Facebook Live we quickly suspended worship and began to create a service for Facebook that people could watch from home. We realized from the beginning that this service would be very different from our regular services. Over the next month, we created a service for people to view online. To appeal to people sitting at home in front of a computer we decided to shorten many aspects of the service.









When the pandemic spread to Massachusetts we were in the middle of Lent and doing a mid-week Prayer Service. Because of the pandemic, we decided to continue the prayer service every week into the summer as well. (It includes 2 readings, a prayer, a scripture passage and several quiet hymns.)

During May we polled the congregation about whether they were pleased with the online worship options. From the survey we heard from 57 family units in our congregation. Of that group 26 families said that they were watching worship weekly.

There was a general level of satisfaction with the worship services. We believe that the strength and satisfaction of the audience for these online worship experiences had an impact on the survey results. It revealed that most of our members were not interested in returning to the sanctuary until there is a vaccine for the virus. That conclusion might change and we plan to continue asking for your ideas and input. For now, a least, there still seems to be fairly widespread approval of the online worship services and enthusiasm for them.

From Facebook statistics we also learned that there was a larger than expected audience for our services from April through June. Facebook indicates that most Sunday services attract an audience of 260 - 30, depending on the Sunday. More recently we have "boosted" the services on Facebook. Boosting is a system for paid advertising where a customer pays Facebook to promote the service. You can choose what geography, age range or economic status you want in your audience. By boosting four services so far we have had a chance to reach as many as 8,000 - 9,000 for each service over the course of a month of boosting. (It costs \$100 to boost a service for a month.) Facebook provides data about who is watching, in what locations, in which age groups etc. We are just starting to evaluate this data.

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2020: A Summer for New Visions

For the rest of the summer our sermons will continue to focus on the lessons we are learning in this time of adversity. No one really learns in times of ease, but sadly, it takes true adversity to teach us the most precious pieces of wisdom in our lives. The Bible was written about people whose faith was founded originally in the midst of a time of true adversity, a journey through a literal wilderness. But for most of us it is the wilderness trips we take that open doors to new understanding about life and faith. This summer our sermons have focused on the lessons of this pandemic, i.e. how to find real community, how to shape a more just society, and how to imagine the future.

Challenges like this pandemic offer vision and hope if you look closely enough. Every wilderness experience opens our eyes to new questions, new insights and new hope for the future.

Sermons for August: The Lessons in the Garden



All summer the sermons are focused on the lessons we are learning together from this pandemic. We are looking at the things we can learn as we shelter in our homes. In July the sermon series was about Home. In August the sermons will have a Garden theme. Lessons we are learning from the pandemic line up with the lessons you learn in the garden.

August 2nd: Home: "The Vision and the Reality" (Luke 4:14-30)



What do we do when home was not a happy place? How do we reconcile our real experiences or challenge with society's images of some ideal home life? How do we navigate all these mixed feelings when we are forced to live in cramped quarters together with our families for extended period of time? Let's talk about how much we all want a home where we feel safe and loved and how hard it can be to go home when bad memories make it hard to be at peace when we are at home. Jesus' experience of going home to Nazareth holds wisdom for us as we navigate our own homecomings.

August 9th: "Gardens Teach Hope" (Genesis 2 Garden of Eden)



When you plant seeds you take a leap of faith. We humans are people of hope and whatever we have to face we hold onto hope in good and bad times. The Bible story begins with stories of Creation that tell of God's hope for us. As a species we are born bathed in God's hope for us and for the future. It's an important reminder of this core strength in human beings, **Hope.**

August 16th: "Humility" (Matthew 13:3-9 Parable of the Soil)



So much about life and gardens humbles us. Despite our dreams and plans we grow to see that we cannot control the outcomes of so much that we plant in earnest hope. Part of living a good life is being resilient when we are humbles by the changes in life we cannot control.

August 23: "Patience" (Matthew 13:24-30 Parable of the Weeds)



Life is complicated and messy. Blessings are so often bundled up with challenges. We only thrive when we learn to accept it all in one bundle. Jesus teaches us how to find the grace to do that.

August 30th: "Generosity" (Ruth 2, Harvest for All)



When Ruth became a widow she had to glean in the fields to survive but the Israelites planned for those who had less and made sure that everyone with a field to harvest would take care of those with less. What does the Bible teach us about how to ensure that all people have a chance to prosper? And how can those lessons shape our lives right now?

In her July 24th EBLAST message, Rev. Susan mentioned that the antique table in the hallway outside of the sanctuary was donated to Rev. Monbleau by Mr. and Mrs. Davenport West. During the winter months, the Wests resided in New York City in the famed Dakota Apartments (aka home of John Lennon and Yoko Ono). But throughout the summer, their hearts belonged to Harwich Port, where they faithfully attended Pilgrim Church. Here are Karin Larson's memories of the Wests on Neel Road.

I particularly remember that the Wests had a cute wooden station wagon that they used when they were on Neel Road! The pine lot we now own had a log cabin owned by the NY seamstress to Wests. She originally had our house, but then had a log cabin built when my mother bought #93. We purchased the log cabin after she died & we summered there, renting our main house until early 60's when we switched to renting the cabin. (We experienced the horror of a fire in 2002 when plumber didn't correctly clean floor furnace piping! Fortunately there were no renters at time.)

I never knew in the years the Wests were here that they attended Pilgrim. Was much younger then! Now I'll think of them, and fond summer memories in Harwich Port whenever I pass by the table & chairs. (My mother & I attended an auction of their estate furnishings managed by their son. Bids came in even from Europe!)


